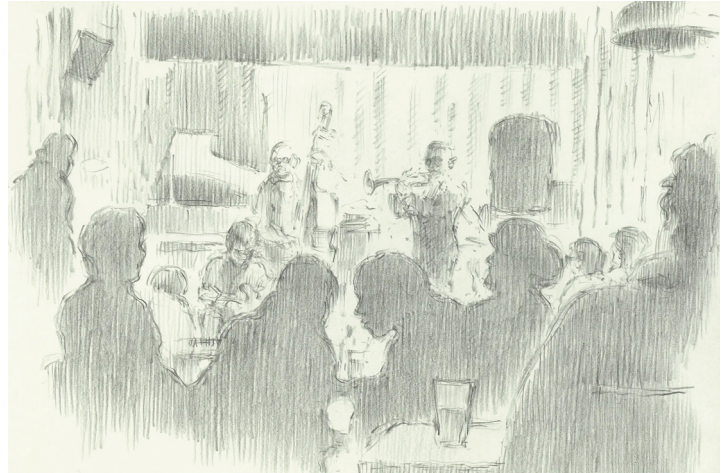

SKRYF with words by Jackie Kay at the Milton Keynes International Festival

SKRYF is a mechanical sandwriter created by Dutch artist Gijs van Bon which moves along leaving behind a stream of phrases created out of sand that will last as long as the passage of time and the elements allow. In a special one-off collaboration, leading writer and poet Jackie Kay has been commissioned by IF: 2014 in association with the Poetry Society to create poetic words and lines, composed with Milton Keynes in mind, for SKRYF to 'print' across the city on pathways and cycle routes.

The Poetry Society Annual Lecture, 'The Poet as Witness' with Carolyn Forché

London Event, Purcell Room, Southbank Centre, Belvedere Road, London SE1 8XX. Sunday 20 July, 5.15pm. £10. Carolyn Forché explores how poets have been shaped by extreme events. From William Blake, caught up in the Gordon Riots, to Emily Dickinson living through the American Civil War, or Thom Gunn watching his friends die of AIDS, what has been the impact of being an eye-witness to suffering? Using the work of John MacRae and Isaac Rosenberg who fought on the battlefields of World War I, to dissidents who lived with surveillance, internment and exile – such as Akmatova and Mandelstam, American poet Forché examines poems composed at the limits of human endurance.
