

7,600 new voices: Foyle Young Poets World's largest poetry competition celebrates record number of entries

The Foyle Young Poets of the Year Award 2014 has broken all the records to become the largest poetry competition in the world. A record-breaking **7,600+** young poets (aged 11-17) entered their poems from the very four corners of the earth; with submissions from a staggering **78** countries. This London-based competition run by the **Poetry Society** cemented its global appeal this year, with entries from as far away as Benin, Nepal, Russia and Papua New Guinea.

With such fierce competition, as thousands upon thousands young poets flock to enter each year, to be selected by the judges as one of the top 100 (15 winners and 85 commended poets) is a seriously impressive achievement. This year's world-class winners will be announced at a glittering awards ceremony in London on **National Poetry Day, 2nd October 2014**.

Since it began 17 years ago, the Award has kick-started the career of some of today's most exciting new voices, including multiple-award winner Martha Sprackland, and Ian Burnette whose poem 'Dutch Baby' was Highly Commended in the prestigious Forward Prizes earlier this year by a panel including broadcaster Jeremy Paxman. The Foyle Award is a career-defining moment for many of its winners. The phrase 'Former Foyle Young Poet' is now found in countless professional biographies as alumni continue to make their mark on the wider literary world, their names appearing on bookshelves and at festivals the world over.

The quality of entries this year was, as ever, of world-class standard. This year's judges, acclaimed poets Grace Nichols and Simon Barraclough have their work cut out selecting the winners ready for the 2nd October announcement. Many of these poems explore with an impressive skill and maturity a wide range of issues, from the perils of social media to the conflicts in the Middle East.

All 100 winning poets will attend a prize giving ceremony at **Royal Festival Hall** in London on **Thursday 2nd October (National Poetry Day)**. The Top 15 Foyle Young Poets of the Year will also attend a residential writing week at one of the prestigious Arvon Centres. All 100 winning poets will receive book prizes and become Youth Members of the Poetry Society, the UK's leading poetry organisation.

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Editor's Notes

National Poetry Day Live – 2nd October 2014

National Poetry Day is a nationwide celebration of poetry held on the first Thursday in October. Since 1994 it has shaken poetry from its dust-jacket into the nations' streets, offices, shops, playgrounds, train stations and airwaves, through live events, happenings, classroom activities, conversations, broadcasts, tweets and spontaneous uncontrollable outbursts of poetry. The theme this year is **Remember**. National Poetry Day Live is presented by the Poetry Society and Southbank Centre and has run every National Poetry Day since 2009. The programme of events runs 1-8pm at Clore Ballroom, Royal Festival Hall, Southbank Centre, Belvedere Rd, London, SE1 8XX. Admission is free.
